

MA *in* Modern Greek Studies: History

This new Master's programme is offered for the first time for registration in September 2009 (for one year full-time, or two years part-time study). It is the only programme in the UK, and one of few outside Greece, that provides this level of specialist teaching in the field of Modern Greek History within a one-year format.

The programme is discipline-based and specialises in 19th- and 20th-century Greek history, with particular reference to the processes of nation- and state-formation and consolidation, and the causes, nature and content of the Greek civil war of the 1940s.

About us

King's College London offers a unique combination of facilities for research and learning in the subject: within King's, the Maughan Library houses the premier collection of Greek publications in the UK, while the Liddell Hart Centre for Military Archives holds written and visual material on Greece in the 1940s. Additional archival material is held at the National Archives, Kew, including Colonial and Foreign Office papers on Cyprus.

At King's, the Centre for Hellenic Studies organises a series of major lectures and public seminars in every semester and hosts an international conference every 2 years. These events attract scholars from Greece, Cyprus, the USA and other countries, providing an unrivalled research environment for the aspiring student.

Content of the programme (taught modules)

7AABMA31 Greece in the 1940s: A nation in crisis (40 credits)

7AABMA32 The politics of unification, integration & homogenization in Greece (1820s–1940s) (40 credits)

7AABMA40 Dissertation (compulsory module) (60 credits)

Additional modules (up to maximum 40 credits) may be selected from one or more of the following programmes, subject to availability:

- ♦ MA Modern History
- ♦ MA European Studies
- ♦ MA Modern Greek Studies (interdisciplinary)

Entry requirements

An Upper Second degree from a UK university, OR a GPA of 7.5 from a university in Greece or Cyprus, OR a GPA of 3.3 from a university in the US or Australia, OR an equivalent qualification in: Modern History or Modern Greek Studies. For all students, a competent working knowledge of Modern Greek is required. For students whose first language is not English, please see the current requirements of the School of Arts and Humanities.
